EDITORIAL



Greetings

Congratulations to Cornwall Council for repairing the sink hole between Creusa and Gunwen – what a pleasant surprise! Hope the hot weather doesn't melt the new tarmac!

All this talk of coping with heat waves in Britain reminds of the really warm places I have lived in over the years. Back in 1980, when I moved to Houston

coping with this wasn't a problem. The typical climate was 90/90 (90°F and 90% humidity) – good for growing okra, which we did in great abundance, but not comfortable for people. However, all houses were built with very efficient air conditioning, as were cars and offices and the underground tunnel walkway system (with AC) allowed one to traverse the downtown part of the city at lunchtime to visit shops and restaurants without facing the outdoors. By this time, American home appliances were made for convenience as well: home washers and dryers of a launderette size to us, pyrolytic (self-cleaning) ovens, garage doors that opened at the touch of a button from inside the car and of course, fridges (very large) with built in ice-dispensers at the front.

Move on another 10 years and I find myself living in Riyadh and to quote TE Lawrence (Seven Pillars of Wisdom), "By day the hot sun fermented us". Whilst my villa (in a compound) had excellent AC, the ministry office where I worked did not. It was a somewhat ancient building constructed of 2-3 feet thick sandstone walls which of course did help – a bit. However, although Riyadh was significantly warmer than Houston it had the advantage of having humidity nearer to 10%. One curious spin-off of this was that whilst getting back to the compound and jumping into

the pool to get some exercise was fine, immediately on getting out, one freezes for a couple of minutes, before getting cooked again!

This brings me to water safety back home. Fifty years ago, when fishing with my friend on his boat out of the Tamar, we had to listen to the shipping forecast early in the morning. Now we have the luxury of looking at the internet when convenient. Also, we have additional data existing on sites such as tides4fishing, allowing one to drill down into detail for almost every estuary, port or river in the world. So, in addition to tides, winds, air and sea temperatures, one can observe swell height, period and direction – all important for small craft in particular. As for safety equipment, the number of times when kayaking I have seen paddleboarders wearing just flimsy swimsuits... well it's a nice day, so nothing untoward is going to happen is it?! Sorry, but it's the sea and trouble can strike at time. So, no matter what type of craft we are in or on, we should always wear a PFD (Personal Flotation Device).

However, here's a recent lesson for me. A couple of years ago whilst I was snorkelling near the coastline just outside the Fowey estuary, someone on a boat, presumably not seeing me (I trust) threw an anchor overboard, which just missed! This prompted me into getting a fluorescent swim buoy to tow for future outings.

WHAT A FEELING...

I was lucky to be one of almost 350 Rock Choir members and their plus ones (mine included) that headed to New York in March to perform at the world-famous Carnegie Hall having been invited by Distinguished Concerts International New York. The trip was the brainchild of our choir leader, Marcus Allenye, who, when becoming leader of Cornwall Rock Choir believed it was possible. The invitation was extended in late 2023/early 2024 when the planning began. As not all Cornwall Rockies were able to go the invitation was extended over the border to Devon choirs and beyond.

The anticipation and excitement of the venture had been building for months, and we finally flew from Heathrow on Tuesday 18th March, landing at JFK later that same day. After transferring to our hotel, just off Times Square, we headed out to explore as we only had a short time there. Having passed Bryant Park on the way to the hotel we wandered over for a coffee in the sunshine (albeit a bit chilly) before taking a look at Grand Central Station as our planned performance there had been cancelled – grand indeed!

Wednesday saw us performing at the Naumburg Bandshell to a very appreciative audience. Starting with a flashmob to Aerosmith's I Don't Wanna Miss a Thing we put on a short, open-air concert which even involved a member of the choir being proposed to! Thankfully she said yes. The sun shone and we sang our hearts out in Central Park. A highlight of the visit for sure.



We had an overcast rainy start to Thursday and so our plans for an impromptu performance and photoshoot in Times Square were curtailed. An a cappella performance of the Guns 'n' Roses classic Sweet Child of Mine was enjoyed by those who were out and about at an early hour. Sightseeing trips had been planned for the afternoon, and we were off to Liberty Island. After a bit of confusion over the number of people on the trip, we boarded the ferry and headed out. We decided not to get off at Liberty Island and instead headed to Ellis Island. It must have been a very daunting place to arrive at when entering the US back in the day, although I am unsure why the stall doors in the toilets were so short – left little to the imagination! I even found a couple of Soady's that had entered the US via the island. We then headed over to the 9/11 memorial and museum to pay our respects. Only one of the reflection pools was operational and they are positioned where the towers once stood with the names of all those who lost their lives that day placed round the outside.

Friday, another sunny but cold day, was rehearsal morning, with a run through of as many songs as possible concentrating on those to be sung with piano accompaniment rather than the usual backing track, so that the nuances of the performance could be perfected. The afternoon was pre-planned and booked with a visit to USS Intrepid which is moored on the Hudson followed by a trip up to the Edge, a ledge 100 storeys up with an almost 360 -degree view of New York and the surrounding boroughs. I'm not a fan of heights so I avoided the small area of glass flooring, but I am so glad I went, as the views were spectacular!

Saturday was performance day, and the nerves started to build (just a little) and we headed off to the venue ready for rehearsals. To say that it was an emotional roller coaster from start to finish would be an understatement. The experience is one I will remember for a long time to come. Our three choir leaders, Marcus, Richard and Carey put us through our paces to make sure we gave the best performance in the concert later that day. After a short break for lunch it was Show Time! The concert itself went in a flash, even though it was 90 minutes, it felt like no more than five! The blending of harmonies was only enhanced by the performance venue which enabled me, a soprano, to hear the beautiful, deep, rich tones of the bass section quite a way away. From the opening bars of Sweet Child of Mine to the final bars of Don't Stop Me Now we sang our way through over twenty songs, including Shake a Tail Feather, A Thousand Years, Video Killed the Radio Star, For Once in my Life and more with the audience appreciating and joining in along the way. A performance and moment in time I will never forget. To top it off I not



only had my husband in the audience, but two friends flew down from Canada that morning to come to the concert and meet up for dinner afterwards – a truly memorable day.



As our flight did not leave until very early on the Monday, we had all day Sunday to ourselves. We started the day with breakfast in Brooklyn overlooking lower Manhattan and then walked the Brooklyn Bridge back into New York. We located the Flat Iron building only to discover it covered in scaffolding, drove an F1 simulator, visited the Harry Potter store and ventured, briefly, into Macey's. We stood at the foot of the Empire State building and located the Friend's fountain in Central Park and finally a piece of New York Cheesecake before heading to the airport and home.

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LUXULYAN 100 YEARS AGO

Transcribed from the original text in Western Morning News and Cornish Guardian

WMN. 4 August 1925: Smithing business as going concern; reason for selling ill health. Solomon, Luxulyan.

WMN. 18 August 1925: Cornish properties for sale by Messrs Button & Mutton include - - - -. On August 25 at Luxulyan will be submitted by them a number of cottages with gardens, situate at Carne Cross, as well as fields etc. **CG. 7 August 1925:** Parents' Day at Council School. Parents Day was observed at Luxulyan Council School on Thursday last. Mr CT Trevail JP CC presided and congratulated the scholars on making such good attendances for

a country school, many of them having to come about two miles. The percentage for last year was 95.6.

After the children had sung 'You'll get there' and 'The harp that once' the Rev CF Jones presented the prizes. The following had made perfect attendance for the year ended 31st March last and each received a book: Ruth Pollard, Ruby Higman, Ruby Wherry, Madeline Lobb, Joan Trevail, Marjorie Parker, Dorothy Pollard, Mabel Lobb, Miriam Thomas, Maurice Thomas, Stanley Wyman, Reggie Knight, William Wherry, Leonard Lobb, Alec Pollard, Fred Parker, Reg Giles and Ernest Ward.

Other prizes were presented for good attendance and proficiency. Mr Trevail proposed and Rev CF Jones seconded a vote of thanks to Mr Hosking and the teachers for obtaining such a splendid lot of prizes as an encouragement to the children, after which cheers were given by the children for the managers and parents who attended.

- **CG. 14 August 1925:** A correspondent signing himself 'Ratepayer' calls attention to the fact that many of the children attending the schools have to travel over roads and paths in the winter-time which are almost impassable. He wants to know whether there is any parish council in existence and suggests that the expenditure of a few pounds would put matters in order.
- **CG. 18 September 1925:** Funeral of Mrs Carthew. The death took place on Monday August 31st of Olive, wife of Mr H Carthew of Treskilling, Luxulyan and youngest daughter of MC and A Osborne of Old Pound, at the early age of 23 years. There was an unusually large number of sympathisers at the funeral on Thursday September 4th, which took place at Luxulyan Rev CF Jones officiating. - - - - -
- **CG. 18 September 1925:** A billiard match was played at the Institute on Thursday last, between teams representing Luxulyan and Lanhydrock Institutes, and resulted in a win for Lanhydrock by 848 points to 807. Scores: CF Jones 119, L Symons 115, W Dyer 150, R Wherry 150, J Keam 150, substitute for G Ward 123, total 807. Lanhydrock R Landrey 150, L Coad 150, G Thomas 144, W Coad 117, B Chapman 137, Leslie Coad 150, total 848.

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

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
A TRAVELLER'S TALE FROM A NOT-SO-BYGONE ERA – 8 Fawlty Towers is alive and kicking!

In my experience, hotels in the developed world generally seem to be well run. Long after the iconic series first aired on our TV screens in the 1970s, surely our hospitality service back in Blighty would have improved! Well, recall some of the episodes and you'll see that the events below could almost have been lifted from that series, and all happened within the last 30 years.

There were many occasions when I stayed in Oxford whilst running a series of management training courses, some residential. However, finding the perfect location was sometimes challenging.

Once, I was staying at an hotel which was a bit tired, located half a mile from the centre of town. One morning I met my colleague at breakfast, and he recounted earlier events of the day. It seemed at 5am there was a knock at the door and the Night Porter questioned whether he was running a bath which had overflowed, as the room below had water coming in. "No", he had responded and looked around. Well, during the night there had been a tremendous rainstorm and a

window which had been open, had allowed water from a broken downpipe and gutter to channel straight into the room, giving rise to a flood! As a result, some of his clothes needed laundering and he needed to check his camera wasn't damaged. It was now 8am and we had to go off and deliver our course lectures elsewhere, so he asked the front desk to record what had happened and he'd take this up with



Several miles south of Oxford, beautifully situated next to the river sat a new hotel (4*) built/reconstituted from old buildings in the mid-1990s. Generally, staying here was an enjoyable experience and we used it for residential courses, as both bedrooms and conference facilities were excellent. However, during one stay I was eating a breakfast roll and got something stuck in my throat. (I had a bad habit of gulping my food without chewing in those days.) It didn't shift and as soon as I got back to Cornwall I arranged to see the doctor. Anyway, out popped what appeared to be the vertebra of a small rodent! Public health traced the hotel's supplier – a bakery in Northampton – but as they had an impeccable record and nothing could be proven regarding my story, no further action was taken.

Now the same hotel group built a spanking new hotel in Bath stone nearer the centre of Oxford in the noughties, and I decided to use it shortly after its opening. Having driven from Cornwall, and arriving at 6pm, I went to the front desk and told them I had quite a few bags and boxes of training materials and asked if the porter could assist me with moving baggage to my room. "Well, it's not really convenient" came the response. "He's having a break". "Could you check in later – say in half an hour or an hour?"! We fell out with this hotel shortly afterwards when a thief posing as a delegate convinced one of the staff to open our locked conference room door during lunch (against our instructions) and then made off with three laptops. The hotel never admitted liability.

Later within the last decade, we were back at the "bone in a roll" hotel, and three of us (the team) sat down to breakfast one day. I ordered my usual tea and toast, but I also fancied some fish. So I asked the waitress if she could check with

chef that the haddock was undyed, as I didn't care for the chemically smoked version. A few minutes later she came back with my "Early" grey tea (as she called it) and I followed up on the fish's provenance. She looked at me strangely and said, "Sorry – it died." By this time my colleagues were a falling about laughing. "No," I responded, "I want it undyed or not at all". "Don't be silly," she said admonished, "It's not live. You

get it died or not at all!" By the way, she was from Bucharest, not Barcelona.

With guitars, lutes, charangos, recorder and cornets we demonstrate the brilliant rhythmic fusion of locally composed and Spanish music that took place in cities such as Zacatecas (Mexico) and Potosi (Bolivia).

As European musical culture spread it was adapted, localised and invigorated by the percussive rhythms of Andean indigenous dance music. Galliarda explores this explosion of creativity in unique and highly original performance using a range of unusual voices and instruments.

It's lovely that you want me to come and live near you but I need more time to think about it. I've lived here all my life and it's where your dad and I met and married, and where you were born. Anyway, I'm looking forward to your visit. Of course I understand that you're tied to school holidays now Charlotte is at school. Three hundred miles is a long way to travel just for a weekend.

I wanted to write and thank you for the flowers, but I'll ring you on Sunday as usual. I love hearing Charlotte's chatter. Lots of love

Laura felt as though she was looking at herself. This woman, mother of Clive and grandmother of Charlotte, could have been her – a widow, whose family had moved away, being asked to leave everything she knew and start afresh. It was a mirror image of her own situation.

September: we will be celebrating harvest both for food and in nature in thanksgiving October: looking at All Saints and the light in the world; Pumpkins may be involved!


November: Considering Remembrance

The following day found us heading to Clacton-on-Sea to introduce Amelia to the beach. A lovely long stretch of golden sand with a lively promenade and town, though we arrived late for lunch, so we enjoyed a picnic courtesy of Morrisons and Starbucks before heading home.

Following on from a glorious blossom filled spring, my summer fruit has been bountiful. Although I had good intentions of netting my redcurrants after last years' bird raids, I ended up only netting the blackcurrants. The redcurrant had grown so vast as to make getting a net on it, just a bit silly. I was pro-active in harvesting the fruits as soon as they were ready, however I need not have worried, the birds didn't take many at all, there are even a few berries still left. I will be trying to net around my grape vine though, there are a couple of bunches coming on nicely.

The garden in general is a little dry and crispy around the edges and looking a bit sad. However, seeing a new gatekeeper butterfly pumping up its wings on one of my lavender bushes was heartening. It was also reassuring to know that my approach in the garden is enough to support a good habitat for the local wildlife.

Luxulyan Environment Green Glebe Space

Another two months have passed! Oh boy! Has the weather had an effect on the site?!!! A huge amount of growth has taken place all over the site; the nettles in some areas are nearly

as tall as an adult but make a great habitat for moths and butterflies. We hope that during the hot summer days we will see more and more butterflies.

We scattered lots of wildflower seeds in the meadow last year including yellow rattle which weakens the thuggish grasses, and we have seen lots of evidence of successes – but there is a long way to go. We have cleared some of the brambles to allow some sun to get to the meadow. In the process we found newts and frogs.

At long last the pond digging has started but with the current dry weather it will be winter before we can say that it is a pond! We have to purchase a liner and liner protector, and we plan to plant some bullrushes and a few other native aquatic plants – and then let the wildlife come to us. We hope for dragonflies, newts, frogs, water boatman and skaters amongst other things.

We must say thank you so much to everyone who have supported us financially over the last couple of months; the April Bake and plant sale raised £182, the Clay Country Plant fayre at Roche raised nearly £300 and our George Kestell cheese and wine evening celebrating our 3rd birthday raised



£200. These fundraisers have gone a long way to pay our rent (£450) for the next year and to renew our lease for the next three years (£750 + VAT) – yes, our costs have risen a lot, but we are not down! We reflect on the progress we have made down there and celebrate our successes.

The apple trees planted in an exceptionally cold January are thriving and the new hedges are beginning bush out. The scything skills are being put to good use! It has been a joy to meet all our volunteers – however often they turn up. All have been a great help and is much appreciated.

We have our regular visitors to the site: it is open 24/7 for people to visit. But please take care as the paths are uneven after the shelter – we have much to do to reinstate them after all the spring growth.

Our next volunteer mornings take place on **Saturday 9 August** and **Saturday 13 September** both 10 – 1 pm but you don't need to stay for the full time – tasks found to suit abilities and refreshments provided. We look forward to seeing you.

Dear friends

As I write this young people across the country will be poised to receive examination results, prompting a choice of career paths, choice of university or a vocational course. Many stories in scripture affirm human beings are 'Born Free,' a freedom defined in the ability to make choices. These choices go beyond the daily choices of life such as which clothes to wear and what to eat today, although there are far too many in the world for whom such choices exist only in their dreams. The



Bible concentrates on the choice of priorities and perspectives in life. So, the story of Adam and Eve shows humanity as responsible beings, having a real choice whether to accept God's guidance or not. Ruth positively chose to stay with Naomi when it was assumed widows would return to their own people. Jesus freely chose the way of faithfulness to God which would lead to his death.

Before we get carried away with the sense of power that accompanies the exercising of choice, Jesus warned his first disciples against using freedom to throw their weight about. "Not so with you," Jesus said, and speaking of himself continued "for even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve" (Mark 10:45).

This puts a totally different complexion on what it means to exercise choice as free, responsible and most of all loving human beings. Is it loving to make unrealistic demands of others to avoid taking responsibility for our own actions? Probably not. Is it loving to insist everyone else agrees with us so that we don't need to check whether our assumptions are still fit for purpose in the 21st century? Probably not.

So, although we may sometimes feel we have little choice in the decisions that face us, more often than not nothing could be further from the truth. We have a real choice in the manner of our response. We may add value to every decision by freely choosing that which better reflects the sort of love and service Christians see in Jesus. After all, the implications of the choices we make may only be truly known by those who come after us.



COUNTRY DIARY

8th MAY 2025

At 6.30.am I hear the cuckoo calling over Treskilling Downs and then again at 9.42.am. At Luxulyan Maggie and Keith report a pair of mating broad bodied chaser dragonflies over their garden. Down at Heligan several house martins are busy swooping to gather mud from the pigs 'wallowing' pool to construct their nests somewhere beyond the poultry orchard. Back at home I encounter a pair of mallard swimming in POND 3, and I wonder how many minnows and sticklebacks now remain!



13th MAY

I walk in the garden through a 'blizzard' of willow seeds. Then, becoming aware of a slight movement high up in a Turkey oak, I observe a spider's web delicately defined

with willow seeds swaying gently in the easterly breeze like a ghostly apparition.

14th MAY

The musky fragrance of hawthorn blossom fills the air as I discover some recently shredded honeysuckle stems. This would suggest that the dormice are still resident and have gathered it to construct their summer nests. A 2023 survey reports that since 2000 Britain has lost 70% of its dormouse population.



19th MAY

Willow seeds now carpet the ground and adorn the nodding bluebells.



21st MAY
Cool only 16°C at midday. A
bumble bee finds some
welcome warmth on a sunlit
bramble leaf.

24th MAY

Hawthorn petals fall like confetti after much needed overnight rain. As the sun is setting a song thrush fills the sky with his joyous phrases.

. 30th MAY

The bees are busy finding nectar in the tiny cotoneaster florets while others have discovered the newly-opened bramble flowers. As dusk descends the distinctive call of the enigmatic nightjars begins just beyond the garden.

2nd JUNE

A chiffchaff calls and a blackcap sings but I listen in vain for the soft, whispered cadence of the song of the willow warbler. That quintessential sound of summer by the stream is missing.



6th JUNE

A cool but sunny day. A fledgling bullfinch appears on the seed dispenser along with an adult male and female, presumably its parents. Heavy rain late afternoon and into the evening.

7th JUNE

At midday comes a sudden heavy downpour but at 12.45.pm I can see 'Jimmy Rowe' bubbles. Jimmy Rowe

lived at Seven Stars near my mother's childhood home at Bodwen. According to her, Jimmy said that if rain created bubbles as it fell, the shower would soon cease. By 12.53.pm the skies have cleared, and the air is enlivened with the sharp, astringent scent of the abundant elder blossom.



9th JUNE

I come upon two male bullfinches feasting on the newly ripened sorrel seeds on plants that, for this reason, I have allowed to grow on a grassy bank.



11th JUNE

A small flock of herring gulls mob a drifting buzzard high up in the sunlit sky. I hear the contact calls of newly fledged great tits as I pick some delicate blooms of my favourite rose, Rosa Mundi. Later, several swallows chatter above me but, by now, the wind has become

restless and I see voluminous clouds, full of anger, approaching briskly from the west.

14th JUNE

Torrential showers clear to a welcome sunny day. Blackbird fledglings continue to call out urgently for food from bushes near the house and beyond. Many sycamore 'keys' and ash seeds have been brought down prematurely by the recent wild weather.



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
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COUNTRY DIARY

18th JUNE

Hot! I discover several marsh orchids blooming amongst the ragged robins around the margins of POND 5.



the warm, spirite 20th JUNE

Very hot at 23°C. The constant calling of a green woodpecker (probably a fledgling) encircles me as I sit in the shade of the 'Padstow' beech.

25th JUNE

Thick garlands of creamy hedge bedstraw clothe the roadside bank while the heath bedstraw, of a more fragile appearance, stays close to the ground in the lower pond area.



30th JUNE Cloudy and humid after early mist. I see several red admirals and a comma in the flower garden.



2nd JULY

A silver-washed fritillary

flutters quickly and erratically through the sultry afternoon while the cloying perfume of the privet hangs heavy in the air.



4th AUGUST 2005

Early this morning I cycle out to Canna and as the wind rushes past my ears I discern the song of a willow warbler nearby. Pausing my journey, I watch as a pair of them flit amongst the yellowing leaves of a silver birch. The song has ended, and they are now hovering and twisting in flight to catch insects.

5th SEPTEMBER 2005

As I work in the garden the flickering shadows of many red admirals and the sonorous buzzing of bees tells me that the Ivy, growing nearby, is coming into bloom. David reports seeing several jackdaws mobbing two peregrines over our garden..
