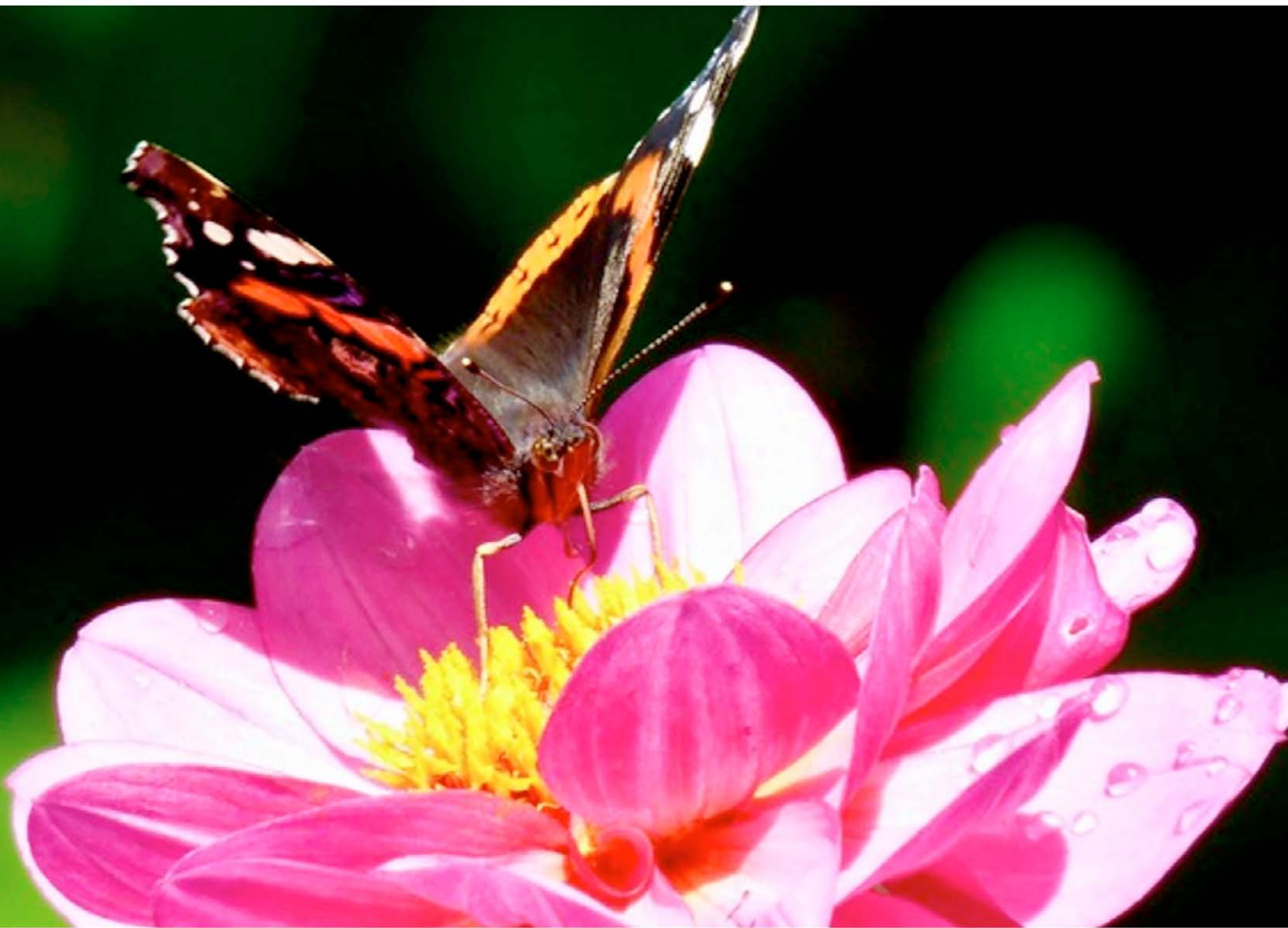

EMAIL FROM OXFORD



After the hot weather of the past few months, my general intention to rethink the garden planting towards those that are more tolerant and hardier has stepped up a notch. Once we reach autumn, I'll be changing some of my current plants for ones that are more resilient. Leaving the weeds to cover the ground certainly helped to retain a bit of moisture this year, but under the intense heat we experienced even they turned crispy and brown. The grasshoppers and crickets haven't minded the dry and warm, and the profusion of ladybirds have enjoyed a smorgasbord of greenfly, which I don't have too much of a problem with at the moment, funnily enough. I feel like I've seen a wider variety of insects this year, including wasps, butterflies and bees. Long may it continue, though a few less weevil grubs in my pots would be good.

For those who have known me since my youth, the view of me with my nose in a book was a familiar sight. My penchant for books has continued, though recently I haven't had much time to enjoy them. A lot of my books in the past, have been science fiction or fantasy - I find that even if things are getting serious and gory in the story, because it's fiction, I don't get quite so affected by the drama. The story can be gripping and not-put-down-able, but as a friend once put it, they're pure escapism. My current favourite author has to be Terry Pratchett; his books set around Disc World are perfect for some satirical humour and often have me chuckling to myself whilst reading.

Another style of book I enjoy are old hard backs which even with wear, are still beautifully bound and decorated, and often have fabulously detailed plated illustrations. They're books that just make me feel happy to flick through.

Whilst reading one of these old books (The Golden Staircase, Poems for Children chosen by Louey Chisholm with pictures by M.Dibdin Spooner, printed in 1906) I recently rediscovered this poem, it's quite apt for the time year, I think.

Bed in Summer by Robert Louis Stevenson

In winter I get up at night

And dress by candle-light.

In summer, quite the other way,

I have to go to bed by day.

I have to go to bed and see

The birds still hopping on the tree,

Or hear the grown-up people's feet

Still going past me in the street.

And does it not seem hard to you,

When all the sky is clear and blue,

And I should like so much to play,

To have to go to bed by day?

By the time I go to bed, it's usually dark, though getting my little one to sleep while it's light outside and she can hear people moving around, is certainly more of a challenge. I have found some thermally lined curtains tremendously helpful in helping to set the tone for sleep.

The evenings have been my main gardening time, often seeing me keeping going until dark, which has been up to 10.20pm. I grew to recognise my gardening time was coming to an end when I could hear the resident frogs starting to hop about the patio and gravelled area. I'm aware of two frogs that regularly patrol around my pots.

The lightness in the night skies throughout the summer remind me of times past, driving home from late shifts when I worked at The Carlyon Bay Hotel, and being awed and fascinated by the glow of dusk still on the horizon at 11.30pm.

The flip side of the later evenings is the earlier mornings of course. I have never been a naturally early riser, however, whatever I would prefer, is now in the hands of my toddler who is generally AWAKE at 5.30am. Long gone are the days when she was first born, when she would happily settle through until 10am! So it is that listening to the dawn chorus has become an accepted part of my days, not a bad noise to wake up to I have to admit. I do hope that as the days gradually shorten, that so does my toddlers sleep lengthen, 6.30am or 7am even, would be amazing!

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LUXULYAN 100 YEARS AGO.

Transcribed from the original text in the Cornish Guardian and Western Morning News by Hazel Harradence

WMN. 21 August 1926: wrestling: F Richards, Old Pound, threw L Burdon, Luxulyan.

CG. 9 July 1926: To be let by tender on a yearly tenancy from Michaelmas 1926 all that farm known as Trescoll in the parish of Luxulyan, containing about 108 acres of arable and pasture land, together with the dwelling house and farm buildings erected thereon. The farm is situate about 5 miles from the market town of Bodmin, 6 miles from the market town of St Austell and 1 ½ miles from Bugle GW Railway station, and is now in the occupation of Mr S Trethewey, who will kindly show the farm on Tuesdays and Thursdays. - - - - - . Sealed endorsed tenders stating rent offered to be sent to the undersigned on or before Monday 26th July 1926. The highest or any tender will not necessarily be accepted.

CG. July 1926: FOLLEY. Jennifer Folley, aged 76 years passed away suddenly at Tretharrup Farm, June 30th .

CG. 30 July 1926: SMALE – GREGORY. A pretty wedding was solemnised at Ebenezer UM Chapel, Bodwen, on Thursday of last week, the contracting parties being Telegrapher Colin J Smale, Royal Navy and Miss Annie M Gregory, youngest daughter of Mr R Gregory of Webworthy, North Petherwin. - - - - -

CG. 6 August 1926: The Fifth Annual Flower, Fruit, Vegetable, Dairy Produce, Bakery and other Exhibits, Public Tea and other Attractions in aid of the Nursing Funds, will be held on Thursday August 12th, to be opened by Col Sir Wm Serjeant OB, at 3pm. Molinnis Fife and Drum Band will attend and at the close lead in a Snail Creep Procession.

School Prize Day. The annual prize day at the Council School was observed on Tuesday of last week. The afternoon was open for parents to visit the school and it was pleasing that several came and inspected the work done by the children. The ladies were specially interested in the exhibition of needlework and were highly pleased with the garments and fancy work done by the girls under Miss Rawe. The infants under Miss Udy showed some clay modelling and handwork. The school garden was visited where the boys with great pride showed their plots. - - - - -

CG. 13 August 1926: Rosemelling, Luxulyan. Sale of Household Furniture and Effects. Mr J Kempthorne Barber has received instructions from Mr W Ivey to Sell by Auction on Wednesday next, August 18th at 3pm the undermentioned household furniture.

CG. 27 August 1926: Silver Wedding. HODGE-CROSSMAN. At Luxulyan Parish Church by the Rev RS Kendall, August 26th 1901, Joseph Hodge to Mary Elizabeth Crossman. Present address Bay View, Charlestown.

CG. 3 September 1926: Croft in the Parish of Luxulyan. Sale of Farm Stock, Poultry and Furniture. Mr J Kempthorne Barber has received instructions from Miss Coom to sell by Auction the undermentioned farm stock: - - - - -.

CG. 10 September 1926: The Late Mr G Darlington. The funeral took place at Luxulyan on Thursday last of Mr George Darlington of Cross. The service was conducted by the vicar Rev CF Jones and the deceased's favourite hymns "Peace, Perfect Peace" and "Let all the Saints in Concert sing" were sung.

The mourners included the widow; Charlie, Courtenay & Harry, sons; Mrs C Thomas & Mrs H Darlington, daughters-in-law; Mrs J Darlington, Mrs Wm Darlington, Mrs J Hearn, Mrs W Tregonning, sisters-in-law; Messrs G Hicks & W Tregonning, brothers-in-law; - - - - -.

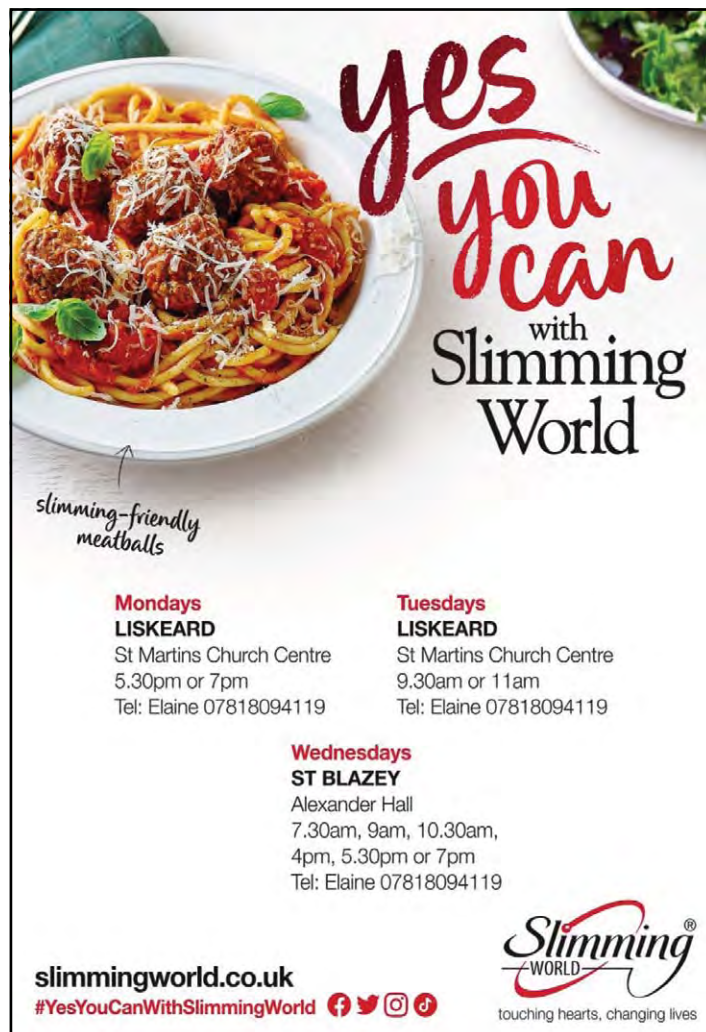

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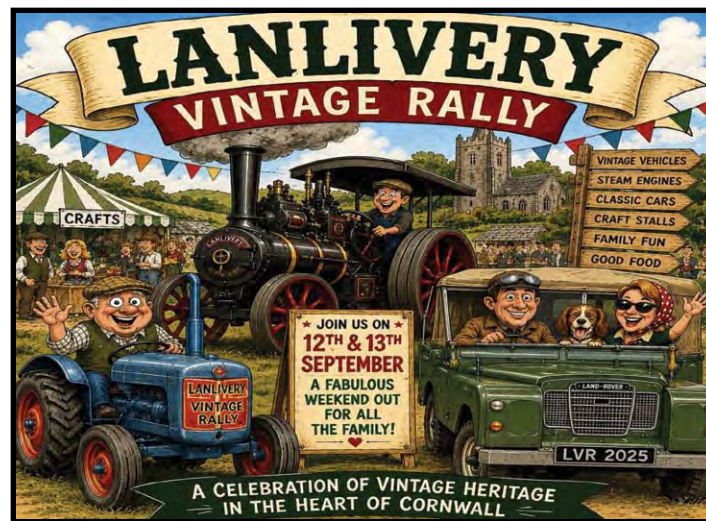
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LANLIVERY SCHOOL

Year 2 - 6 from Lanlivery School went on an exciting day out to the Minack Theatre and PK Porthcurno. The children have written some recounts of the day!

The Minack Theatre and PK Porthcurno

At half past eight, our school boarded the coach to head to the Minack Theatre, for a school trip. It was blazing hot day, whopping 28 degrees, we spent 105 minutes on the coach. When we arrived, we went up a 1/4 of a mile hill to the theatre, when we got there it was scorching hot - even the shaded grass was hot - we were late therefore we missed the start due to traffic and a hill which was very hard due to the temperature. The view was absolutely stunning, a cyan blue sea, with shallow cliffs that drop right into the depths of the ocean. We watched Pinocchio, it was excellent, 5 actors performed all the characters. It was great fun. Then we ate our lunch with a breath-taking view, and a tasty Oreo cookie helped us get through the heat!

The Museum

In the afternoon we entered the air-conditioned PK Porthcurno museum which was a huge relief from the searing heat outside and we followed a tour guide called Paul to a nearby room. He talked to us about Cornwall's role in the development of communication technology. It had some really astonishing old-fashioned electronics. When we left the room, we did a scavenger hunt on morse code, after the hunt we entered an air raid shelter which was built to protect the equipment during the war. We went through an old-fashioned breezy tunnel. They had old bikes and old laser set ups. We left the museum, picked up our bags and departed from the town and headed for the A30.

The coach ride 8:15am

We arrived at school and got on the coach, it was boiling. My friend sat at the window, and I sat in the aisle, during the journey we played some games to pass time, (the ride was roughly 2 hours long.) Luckily, there was air conditioning and it was great.

The Minack Theatre 10:00am

First, we got off the coach the heat smacked us round the face and walked up a big hill to the Minack Theatre. When we got there the view was immaculate, we sat down and watched the show. It was Pinocchio. It was so hot that I went up to find some shade. As it was so hot we went to find shade in the exhibition centre where we watched a video about how the Minack Theatre was started by a lady and her gardener.

Lunch 1:00pm

We walked back down the hill, which was better than going up, there was a big queue off the coach we got outside put sunscreen on and walked towards the museum. We waited for a couple minutes, and we were let into a building which was so cool we sat down and had lunch. The cheese in my sandwich had melted, the teachers gave everybody cold water. We started walking towards the museum Porthcurno Museum.

The Museum

Paul welcomed us into the museum and spoke to us about how technology has developed and improved to help us communicate with people all over the world. We did a trail through the museum using Morse Code. We then headed to the tunnels underground. These were built for the war to protect all the equipment from bombing. It was really interesting to see all the old equipment through the years.

As you can tell it was an incredibly hot day, but we had a fantastic time!

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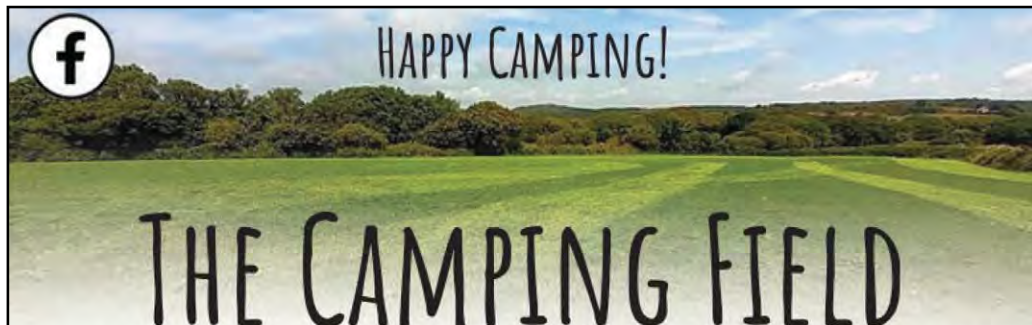
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LUXULYAN SHORT MAT BOWLS CLUB

LUXULYAN PARISH COMMUNITY FUND

In the last 12 months Luxulyan Parish Community Fund (LPCF) has distributed over £30,000 to various projects in the parish and surrounding area. These include funds to help refurbish ladies and gents toilets in Luxulyan Village Hall, install safety railings and replace toilets following storm damage at Biscovey Youth Football Club (Starrick Moor), to support Luxulyan Pre-School as well as for PALS at Luxulyan School for their theatre trip and duckling project, Luxulyan CLT, LADS for black stage curtains and relaunching performances, Granite Valley Bowls for equipment and Gunwen Chapel for remedial building work.

LPCF currently receives funds from two local renewable energy sources specifically for the purpose of supporting community projects within the parish of Luxulyan. Grants are in the range £250 to £5000.

LIFE ON A SMALL HOLDING



Well, I have been lucky with short breaks this year so far – three within the first few months. But it means that I am even further behind on jobs at home! As with other small holders, it has been a busy few months. The grass is growing slowly in the fields due to the heat but growing at a very fast rate on my lawn and gardens. Most days I have poultry, cows and pigs grazing the lawns and garden, so it can be shorn to a manageable length for the lawn mower. Yes – machinery. My friend came along to help me get them all going again (I have about 13 machines to maintain – chainsaws, strimmers, rotovators, mowers, quad etc). Two days after he left, I got the big rotovator out, cultivated some ground and it conked out. I got the two strimmers out – both conked out. He made a quick visit back, pulled the starter cords and they all fired up. This is a common occurrence.

Two of my hens managed to hatch four chicks between them – they were put into a separate chicken house but sadly, the one black chick has recently disappeared. I hope the others will grow into full size hens. I have run out of chicken meat in the freezer. Oh, yes, freezers. The day before I left to go to Scotland, one of my four large freezers decided to defrost. It was full of joints of pork and beef. I spent a frantic few hours disposing of the meat, which had all gone soft (it was a couple of days before I realised the freezer had broken).

When I came back from my last holiday, I found that the washing machine doesn't drain anymore. I read up about this and found that I have to put the machine on its back to access the hose pipe to take off and clean. My bathroom is a unique shape – the machine doesn't fit on its back on the floor. Somehow, I managed to get it tilted enough to clean the pipes.

At least all the animals seem to be doing ok. Well, I'm guessing the calf isn't too happy about being separated from the cow (he should have been weaned a long time ago). I know he isn't happy because I've spent a few days re-fencing around his field.



However, he is back with the cow again, but at least he is starting to self-wean. The lambs are all growing nicely, but one ram looks like he might still have one bit that he shouldn't (after I had banded him).

A few days ago, when I was rock climbing, a hand hold broke off and I fell. Only about 20ft but broke my ankle. It took two and a half hours for my friend and I to get me hauled up the cliff and back to the car. So now I am in a plaster cast. Luckily, I have a good friend who pet sits when I am away. Now, he just treats my place like I'm away and he and his family are here morning and evening to look after the animals.

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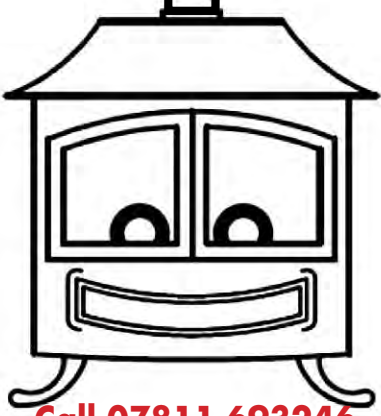
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LUXULYAN ENVIRONMENT GREEN GLEBE SPACE

The nettles and brambles are loving it! We are struggling to keep the paths clear of grass and creeping buttercup and could do with a lot more visitors to walk the paths to keep them clear!

activities day on site and hoping to have good weather to engage them in a variety of activities. It is always good to listen to the children's ideas as they are our future custodians of our rewilding project. We hope they get as much enjoyment out of their day as we do by working on site.

We have been continuing work on the pond and hope that we can landscape it properly during the autumn as well as getting some native water plants to populate the pond. We plan to continue scything the meadows to encourage the growth of wildflowers and to contain the growth of brambles and nettles. Some are good habitats for small mammals and butterflies and moths but there can be too many!

In the autumn we are looking forward to renovating the shelter to make it watertight so a new roof, wooden walls to replace the rotten one and replace the rotten posts. We have been successful in obtaining a grant from Luxulyan Community Fund and we are very grateful for their support.

Our AGM for 2025/2026 will take place on Thursday 30th July at 4 pm followed by a barbecue.

The next volunteer mornings will take place on Saturday 22 August (note change of date – not second Saturday of the month) and Saturday 12 September 10 am to 1 pm. We'd love to see you there.

FROM THE RECTORY

As I write, we are in the middle of the World Cup and England have got to the Quarter finals. In the 60th anniversary year of England's World Cup victory, many of us hold high hopes for the national team, but don't we every time?

I can still remember as a young boy watching the World Cup on 22 June 1986, during the quarter-final at Estadio Azteca, Mexico City, Maradona scored Argentina's first goal against England by using his left hand to punch the ball into the net, outjumping goalkeeper Peter Shilton, who was taller than him. The referee did not see the handball, so the goal was allowed to stand. Maradona famously described it as "a little with the head of Maradona and a little with the hand of God" and it has been inappropriately named, the 'Hand of God' ever since.

However, one joy that has been more evident this time is Christianity appears to be back at the 2026 World Cup. Other than goals, drama, penalties and dodgy VAR calls, one consistent feature of this tournament has been teams and individual players kneeling in prayer on the pitch before and after games.

The World Cup is however far more than a sporting competition. It is a global event that brings together people from different nations, cultures, and backgrounds in a shared celebration of sport.

Sport also reflects something of God's desire for unity. During the World Cup, supporters proudly celebrate their national identities while sharing a common passion for the game. This mirrors the biblical vision of God's people coming together from every nation, tribe, and language. In a world that can often feel divided, churches also have an opportunity to model unity, hospitality, and mutual respect, showing that our differences can be celebrated rather than feared.

With England fans still singing Neil Diamond's "Sweet Caroline" and Baddiel and Skinner's "Three Lions, It's Coming Home, Football's Coming Home" showing their faith in their national team, let us pray that people will also come to grow and show in faith in God.

At this time, as people come together to enjoy the beautiful game, may we also unite in our commitment to compassion, justice, and the wellbeing of our neighbours. In doing so, we reflect the heart of Christ and show that true victory is found not only on the pitch, but in communities marked by love, unity, and hope.

FROM CHURCH

Small Seeds, New Growth

There was a time when the land and the seasons set the rhythm of our days. We knew when to plant and when to harvest, and our bodies lived in step with the world around us, drinking from the same wells that watered the fields and gave drink to the livestock. Land and people sustained one another.

Then we wanted more, and we wanted it now. Pineapples flown in from the Caribbean. Strawberries in February rather than waiting for Kent's crop in June. The old balance fractured. Pollution rose, artificial aids forced ever bigger harvests from tired soil, and waste piled up, landfill filling with food grown, bought, and never eaten.

In the beginning, God looked at creation and saw that it was good. I wonder what God would make of it now. Moving food across the world has become costly in every sense. Perhaps it's time to ask whether we might grow more of what we need closer to home. It may not be the cheapest option, but cheap has never quite been the same thing as best.

The wisdom of small things I think of young David, so far down his family's pecking order that his father hadn't thought to call him in from the fields when Samuel came looking for a king. That same overlooked shepherd boy

later brought down Goliath with a sling and a stone. Jesus said something similar: the smallest of seeds can grow into the greatest of shrubs. Don't underestimate the small. They can make the decisive difference.

Ezekiel pictures God taking the smallest, most tender shoot from the top of a cedar and planting it on a mountain, where it grows into a tree sheltering every kind of bird. "I bring low the high tree," says the Lord, "I make high the low tree" (Ezekiel 17:22-24). The God who creates can recreate. When we get things wrong, there is always a chance to begin again.

Fire and new growth

A few years ago, some thoughtless souls set fire to the gorse above our house, a stretch of scrubland alight for most of the night. By spring, green shoots were pushing through the blackened ground, and by summer you'd never have known. Nature, and God within nature, finds a way. Life wants to live. Gardeners know this: we cut shrubs back hard now, so next year's bloom is fuller. The same is true for people. Those cut back by life, the vulnerable, the marginalised, the abused, have a special place, and God longs to give each of us new life. This means listening to our children, who often have more to teach us than we have to teach them, and championing those whose voices go unheard, the way a few stubborn pioneers, Rosa Parks among them, refused to accept that things had to stay as they were.

So let's take this as a chance to reset, the way we work, rest and play, eat, heat and sleep. We'd love you to join us, a group trying, imperfectly and repeatedly, to make the world a little more like God intended, following the lead of the youngest, the smallest, the most overlooked among us. It's through them that we so often see God most clearly

Dear Friends,

As Storm Francis struck and the excursion arranged with our grandchildren was cancelled, we resorted to Plan B. We played Monopoly. The game did not proceed according to the rules set by the manufacturers for over 80 years (I trust you are not too shocked) but to The House Rules. You may know some years ago The House Rules for Monopoly officially approved certain variations to the game. Whether a board



game or any other area of life, playing by the rules is a key part of the communal life we share.

There are many versions of The House Rules available, but I particularly like the tone of the one for Homes: **In our House: We say Please and Thank you. We Do Our Best. We Stay Positive. We Count Our Blessings. We Forgive and Forget. We Laugh at Ourselves. We Use Kind Words. We Love One Another.**

There has been much comment on how the rules were applied during this summer's football World Cup, with referees variously described as being either too lax or too strict. However clear and plain and extensive the rules may be, no set of rules can ever cover every eventuality. But generally we like rules, we like the clarity and boundaries they provide, we like to know where we stand. Rules are there to see fair play, and very often, like the rules in the Highway Code, rules are there to ensure safety.

The House Rules of Jesus' time was called The Law. Starting out as the Ten Commandments, the Rules had been re-interpreted into over 600 rules and regulations. But all this complication left people worried about absolutely everything they did, and whether it would contravene one rule or another in this complicated confusion of rules. The offside rule would pale into insignificance compared to these rules.

Jesus was asked "Which is the most important of all the commandments?" He replied, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your strength, with all your mind; and love your neighbour as yourself." Love and compassion expressed in caring for others becomes the guiding principle for life. Whether or not we actively decide to follow Jesus' House Rules to love and care, seeking the best for others as well as ourselves could have a far-reaching impact on the game we call Life.

CHARITY COFFEE MORNING AT THE KINGS ARMS

This is held on the last Thursday in each month from 11am. COUNTRY DIARY

5th MAY 2026

A mistle thrush sings early as two male bullfinches' flit amongst the ash boughs. A cuckoo calls briefly in the tree canopy just beyond the flower garden.

**8th MAY**

Bees buzz loudly as they forage amongst the newly opened hawthorn blossom.

10th MAY

The rowan comes into bloom releasing its heady, musky fragrance, similar to that of the hawthorn. I hear the calls of greenfinch fledglings as they shelter amidst the feathery leaves of the large ash.

13th MAY

A chilly NW wind gusts up to 35mph. After an early shower the sun appears. Down by PONDS Two and Three the bluebells and hawthorns create a stunning landscape.

17th MAY

As I pass along Bullfinch Lane, I observe a roe deer hind standing motionless amongst the trees a short distance from me. We watch each other, surrounded by bluebells, as a cuckoo calls nearby. The perfect rural idyll if only the deer would stay in this area and refrain from venturing into the flower garden!

**22nd MAY**

Pots of suet and mealworm pellets that hang outside the kitchen window are in constant use throughout each day by blackbirds, great tits, blue tits, chaffinches and robins, many taking off food for nestlings or fledglings.

23rd MAY

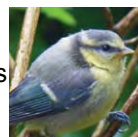
Pleasantly warm. A carder bee discovers the first open bramble flower.

**24th MAY**

Various species of bee busily seek nectar in the tiny cotoneaster florets as a light breeze brings down showers of little ash seeds.

25th MAY

The heat is stifling! Yesterday, in some areas, was the hottest ever May Day on record.

**26th MAY**

Unbearably hot and oppressive. The cuckoo calls as it does most days and I hear blue tit fledglings begging for food. Marsh orchids bloom at the margins of POND Six.

28th MAY

Much cooler today. The refreshing, astringent scents of elder and hydrangea petiolaris pervade the summer morning. A recently fledged blackbird perches on a pot outside the back door and later a very tame young robin follows.

**1st JUNE**

Rainy. The rowan blossom is now brown, and I observe tiny green 'eglets' already formed on the hawthorns. The year has turned.

2nd JUNE

I watch a mother house sparrow feeding her new family from the suet/ mealworm coconut.

**5th JUNE**

The nuthatch reappears after a marked absence.

8th JUNE

I hear the ravens calling from the distant pines. I wonder if they were the victors in the territorial dispute with the crows that I heard on the first day of spring.

**9th JUNE**

Mostly sunny but cool. A male great spotted woodpecker flies past the door with a large chunk of suet 'nugget' in his beak but, in doing so, drops some in the drive where an observant robin quickly finds it.

**11th JUNE**

I think the nuthatch may have a nest somewhere on Rowan Bank where it has been chirruping frequently in recent days. Today it takes off some suet towards that area. Blue tit parents feed their fledglings from the suet/ mealworm coconut.

**14th JUNE**

I discover several mullein moth caterpillars on figwort plants that I have allowed to grow for that purpose. The creatures will eventually pupate and burrow underground where they may stay for five years before emerging to become adult moths.

20th JUNE

The caterpillars continue to munch but, mid-morning as I look across the garden, I see a great tit pick one off the plant and fly off with it! Only three remain to probably face a similar fate.

**25th JUNE**

Very hot and exceptionally humid, resulting in a violent thunderstorm this evening.

COUNTRY DIARY

28th JUNE

The sweet perfume of the honeysuckle wafts on the cool evening air and, beyond the trickling stream, I hear the 'churring' of a nightjar. A pipistrelle bat flits erratically through the fading light.

4th JULY

A sparrowhawk has recently been frequenting the garden but seems slow and confused. I assume it to be a juvenile.

**12th AUGUST 1992**

As I stand by POND Three in the afternoon sunshine a male beautiful demoiselle alights on my left hand and remains there for approximately one minute.

**24th AUGUST 2003**

Hot and sunny with a southerly breeze. David reports seeing a flock of about one hundred greenfinches over Treskilling Downs.

20th SEPTEMBER 1996

The swallows are restless and a blackbird sings his soft subsong at summer's end. It evokes in the listener both memory and anticipation of spring.

28th SEPTEMBER 2009

A jay squawks discordantly and apples drop loudly in the orchard.

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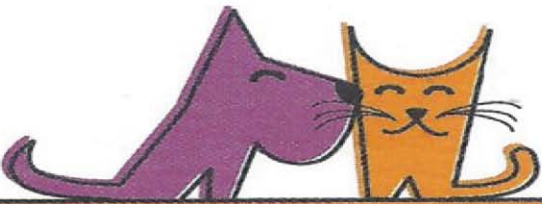
