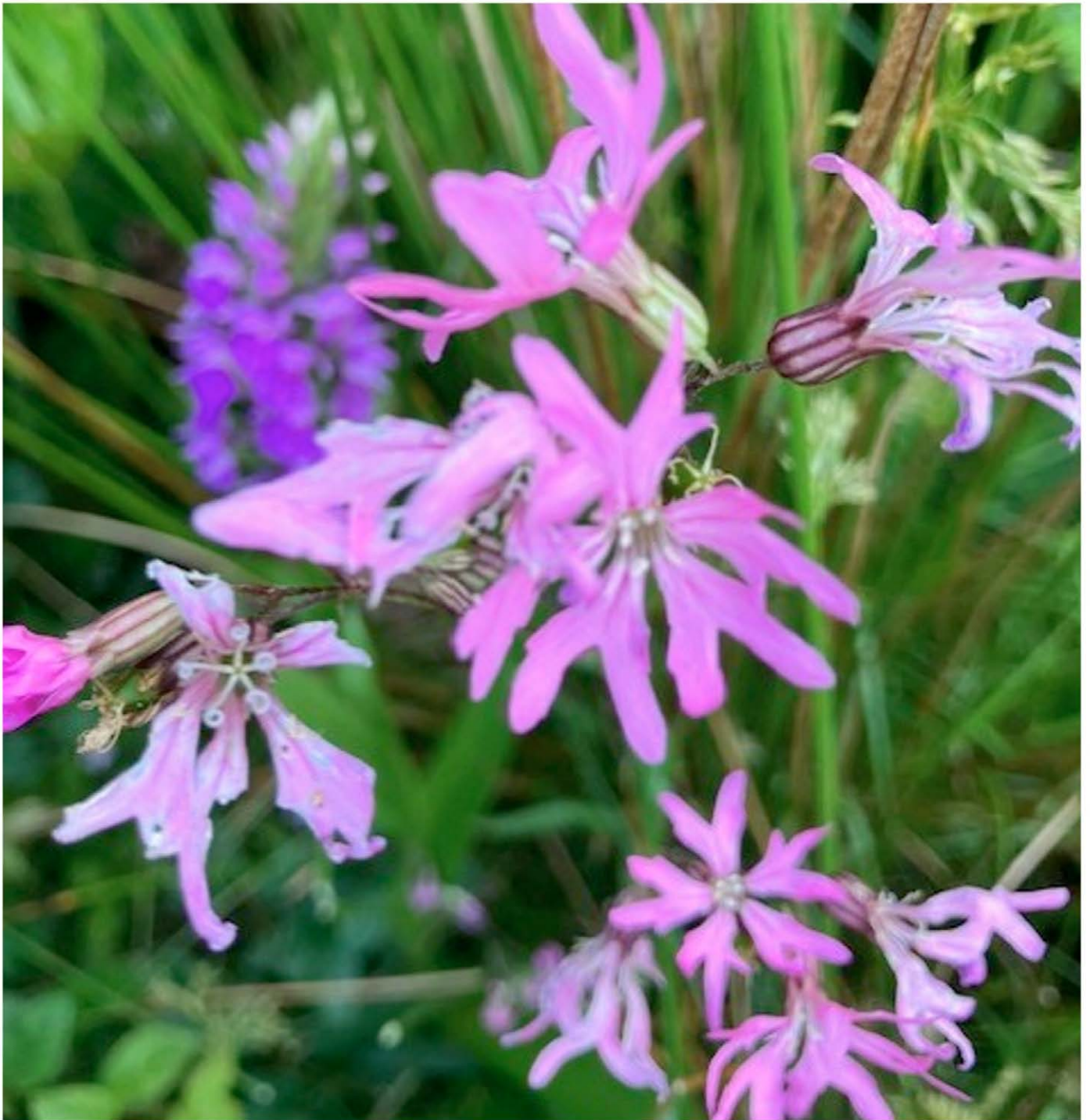

When I hear a lone blue bottle buzzing around the house this again takes me back to summers at Chark, the silence of the sitting room broken only by the ticking of the grandfather clock marking time until lunch or dinner. I still pause a moment in stillness today.

The song 'Young at Heart' by the Bluebells, which was first a hit in the 1980s reminds me of summer holidays spent in Pelynt with my Gran Soady. Having re-tuned her radio this song was popular in the summer of 1984 and when I hear it, I'm 10 years old, spending time doing crosswords, learning to crochet and watching Sons and Daughters and Countdown. I can also see Gran sitting at the kitchen table each morning marking off the bingo cards from the Sun newspaper. We would spend time on long walks where gran would tell me about her childhood in the same area and if I was lucky, a trip to Plymouth.

Bamboléo by the Gypsy Kings reminds me of our first overseas holiday to Turkey in 1997 as the song was played every night in one of the bars we frequented, working our way through the cocktail list! I'm also reminded of the mild sunstroke I suffered as I had not experienced such temperatures before! Funnily enough we are heading back to the same resort this year, almost 30 years since our first visit; I wonder what will have changed in that time?

# EMAIL FROM OXFORD



In sort of line with my intention to grow plants that are more tolerant of my garden environment, I have embraced the spring profusion of weeds. Plants in the wrong place? or, rather right place to do very well, while looking very pretty and helping to sustain the resident mini-beasts. From my point of view, it means minimal 'weeding', only slotting the odd intentionally placed plant or bulb into soil that will hopefully retain more moisture than it would otherwise. Added to which, there is less inclination for the local cats to utilise any open ground. Hopefully in a couple of months' time when the spring 'weeds' have died back my placed plants will have settled in nicely and be able to fill the gaps. At least that's the plan!

Another bonus to letting the weeds take over is that the slugs and snails aren't interested in them in the same way as, for example, some narcissi I bought, which have been annihilated. A plant I invested in in the autumn is a favourite of slugs and snails, dahlia's. I stored them inside over the winter, then potted them up in March to bring them on in my greenhouse. With the hope that when I plant them out in early summer, they're of a size to be better able to cope with my gardens' slimy residents. I'm pleasantly surprised I've managed to get a good response from so many. Nurturing them to the next stage, of flowering, is going to be the next challenge. They are currently kept on a table with a bit of strategic slug deterrent in a few of the pots, but once planted out, they're effectively going to be on their own.

I have tried crushed eggshells before, with very limited effect. I still have a heap of saved clean eggshells which my daughter is currently in the process of spreading around the inside of the greenhouse floor. I was going to tidy it up, but I've decided to leave it as an extra slug and snail deterrent. It provides a satisfying crunch under my feet when pottering around too. Another option I have tried is nematodes, which does make a bit of a dint, though they're best applied when the weather is going to be wet for a few days, which hasn't really happened this spring.

Slug pellets are my fall back, but with a visiting hedgehog, resident toad, frog and immediate household inhabitants, there are limited 'safe' options for applying. Plants will therefore have to be hardy!

My garden time is limited, though with the small two legged 'help' enjoying outside time, I do manage some longer spells and am gradually making some progress in its upkeep. The light evenings are also proving beneficial for garden time too.

The shift into summer and the festival season has stirred us to venture out on a couple of occasions. The first event was a jousting tournament on a local estate. There were: horses, knights in armour, and a bit of friendly competition and staged argy bargy – all part of the show! with a handful of food and drink stalls for refreshment purposes and dry, warm weather, it was a good day enjoyed by all. Amelia loved the horses, pageantry and music, joining in with the applause and becoming invested in the knights' shenanigans. The second 'festival' was an asparagus fest held by the local pick your own farm. A tractor trailer ride, a chance to pick fresh asparagus, then a coffee whilst listening to some live music. From an adult perspective, a pleasant way to spend a morning; from a toddler's perspective, the best thing since sliced bread, with the conversation revolving around tractors and mud for the rest of the day.

I look forward to enjoying a few more summer festival style days before the end of the summer, hopefully you all can enjoy some too.

## LANLIVERY FROM THE ARCHIVES

### Royal Cornwall Gazette – 03rd July 1869

**THE SANITARY CONDITION OF THE PARISH OF LANLIVERY.** To the Editor of the Royal Cornwall Gazette. Sir, —During the past month the sewer authorities of the parish of Lostwithiel have been diligent in causing the abatement of nuisances reported to them by their inspector; and the new drains, notwithstanding reports to the contrary, have proved effective. But I regret to say that the inhabitants are surrounded by nuisances of a most offensive character. The parish of Lanlivery, which encircles two-thirds of Lostwithiel, contains two villages, commonly known by the name of Goosey Town and Tangier, with a population of 600, densely packed, is still unsewered, and in many parts in such a filthy condition, that it is impossible to abate the nuisance without drainage. In those places I have mentioned there are five slaughter-houses, wherein cattle are killed every day for the London market, and yet the local authorities, who compose the vestry for Lanlivery, have never made the slightest effort to remedy the evil complained of. At this time the stench arising from the gutters of those places is enough to engender fever. The insertion of this in your paper, which, from its size and cheapness, will meet the eye of every member of the Nuisance Removal Authority, as well as the other authorities I have mentioned, will oblige yours truly, A Ratepayer in Lanlivery and Lostwithiel. 28th June, 1869

### Cornish Guardian – 12 June 1914

A pretty wedding was solemnised Ebenezer United Methodist Chapel on Thursday, June 4th, contracting parties being Miss Elsie Brown, second daughter of Mr. and Mrs. T. Brown, of Lanlivery, and Mr. Thomas Rawe. Second son of Mr. and Mrs. Rawe of Barguse, Bugle. The bride, who was given away by her father, wore a dress of brown satin, with hat to match, and was attended by her two sisters, Misses Clarice and Letty Brown who wore dresses of pale-blue satin and black hats. Mr. W. Rawe, brother of the bridegroom, acted as "best man". Rev. C. F. Lea performed the wedding ceremony. "The voice that breathed o'er Eden" and other suitable hymns were sung by the choir. Miss W. Roach presided at the organ. The bride and bridegroom were the recipients of many useful wedding presents.

### Cornish Guardian – 12 July 1918

On June 21st Jenefer Hick of Boslymon, Redmoor, passed peacefully away, aged 88. She was the last of the late Mr. Walter and Mrs. Jenefer Hick's family, formerly of Tregantle and Lanlivery. Mrs. Blowey (niece) has been nursing the old lady for some months. Miss Phillips (niece), eldest daughter of the late Mr. Josh Phillipps, Excise Officer, of Tywardreath, was with Mrs. Blowey when the old lady passed away. The funeral was largely attended on June 25th at Lanlivery. The mourners were Miss Phillips (niece), Mr. H. Trethewey (nephew) from Plymouth, Mrs. Blowey and Miss Trethewey (nieces). and Mr. Thomas White, of Trevelyan (cousin). All the funeral arrangements were carried out by Mr. Rouse of Puddle, Lanlivery

### Cornish Guardian – 02 July 1931

At their annual outing on Saturday the local ringers visited Probus, Kenwyn and All Saint's Church, Tuckingmill and rang peals on the bells

### Cornish Guardian – 13 June 1940

The total sum of £5 14s was collected in the Parish of Lanlivery on National Flag Day for the Red Cross and St. John. The collectors were Masters D. Wynne. £2: P. Wherry. 10s. 1d.; Misses R. Dyer and M. Littleton. 11s 3d.; Miss C. Henwood. £1 10s. 9d.; and Miss Loveday Richards. £1 1s. 6d.

### Cornish Guardian 4th June 1953

A united service was held in the Parish Church on Sunday. Rev. W. Elwell preached and Mr. H. A. Hawken, Methodist, read the lessons. A service in the Parish Church on Tuesday preceded sports in a field lent by Mr. A. Best. Tea was provided for all parishioners. Souvenir mugs were given to the children by Mrs. F. J. Seeker. and canisters of tea to the over 70's by Mr. L. P. Higgs. A whist drive and social was held in the evening, followed by a fireworks display and a bonfire. The village was decorated by Mr. Woodthorpe and party, and the school was decorated by the teachers and children.

### Cornish Guardian – 8th July 1954

Silent for more than a year, the bells of Lanlivery church were rung again on Saturday. Their condition had given cause to anxiety and, after an examination by bell founders. £300 was raised in the scattered parish to effect repairs. The work was entrusted to Messrs. Gillett and Johnson, and its completion was celebrated with a short service on Saturday, conducted by the vicar. Rev. W. Elwell. The vicar acknowledged the fine support they had received enabling the work to be done in a year. The opening peal was rung by the Lostwithiel ringers by invitation, and ringing by teams from many other towers in the county continued for many hours. A public tea was served by women members of the church, and profits from the day's events were devoted to further restoration of the church.

## LUXULYAN 100 YEARS AGO.

Transcribed from the original text in the Cornish Guardian and Western Morning News by Hazel Harradence

**WMN. 10 July 1926:** Lanhydrock estate. To be let by tender on a yearly tenancy from Michaelmas 1926, all that farm known as Trescoll, containing about 108 acres of arable and pasture land, together with the dwelling house and farm buildings erected thereon. Now in the occupation of Mr S Trethewey - - - .

**CG. 4 June 1926:** Empire day was observed at the Council School on Tuesday week. Lessons were given on the empire and what it stands for, and patriotic songs were sung.

Services in connection with the Sunday School anniversary were held at Rosemelling on Sunday last, the preacher being Mr J Sturtridge of Penwithick.

**CG. 18 June 1926:** Rosemelling Sunday School treat was held on Tuesday of last week. Favoured with beautiful weather and headed by the Penwithick Band the children paraded the village after which they went into a field where tea and sports were indulged in.

Services in connection with the Sunday School anniversary were held at Bridges UM Chapel on Sunday and in spite of very inclement weather there were good congregations. In the afternoon the choir gave a service of song. Solos were sung by the Misses Phillips, Rowe and Tregonning and Mr W Tregonning. There were some duets. Misses M and E Knight recited. Mrs Roach presided at the organ.

**CG. 18 June 1926:** Luxulyan Nursing Association. Effort in Aid of Funds. A sale of work and dance in aid of the Nursing Association was held in Luxulyan on Saturday. The schoolroom was not available on the school days and unfortunately there were several counter attractions near that affected attendance.

The sale of work and effort was opened by Miss Holden who spoke of the amount of work done by the nurse at Luxulyan, she having made 1,965 visits in the year, answering the call for her services in every part of the parish and in a great variety of cases. Her journeys too were considerable. The support of the nurse in the parish should appeal to everyone. She thought the collecting should be done at least once a quarter and then it left a big margin to be made up by special efforts. The ladies sewing meetings had resulted in the provision of most of the useful and fancy things on the stalls which she hoped would meet with ready purchasers.

On the motion of Mr CT Trevail, Miss Holden was heartily thanked for opening the sale of work and for the interest she had taken in the nursing. A dance followed, Messrs Wyman providing the music. A fair number attended and refreshments were provided by the ladies.

**CG. 25 June 1926 CG:** CHURCH – in loving memory of father who died at Carne Farm June 22nd 1925 from his loving son William.

**CG. 25 June:** Luxulyan Feast. Feast Week commenced at Luxulyan on Sunday. The services at the Parish Church were well-attended, in the morning the vicar, Rev CF Jones, was the preacher, whilst in the evening a crowded congregation listed to a splendid sermon from the Archdeacon of Bodmin, Canon Williamson. After the service the vicarage grounds were thrown open and a sacred concert was rendered by the Bugle Silver Band who very kindly gave their services. A collection was taken in aid of the Church Heating Apparatus Fund.

On Monday a service was held in the church in the afternoon, the preacher being the Rev A Woodward of Cardinham. A public tea was provided in the vicarage grounds. The Bugle Band again discoursed appreciated music and after the tea dancing was indulged in on the lawn. A larger number of people were present than has been the case for a number of years past. The tea tables were kindly provided by Mrs JH Trevail, Miss Holden, Miss Knight and there was also a parish table.

**CG. 2 July 1926:** On Tuesday of last week the scholars and friends of Ebenezer Sunday school held their annual treat. The Bugle Band was in attendance. On Feast Wednesday Bridges Sunday school took their turn. Headed by Penwithick Band the children paraded through Church-town and then went to a field near the chapel, kindly lent by Mr Sturtridge, where tea was partaken of. Sports were afterwards held for the children and the music was greatly appreciated. The proceedings concluded with a service in the chapel.

Thirteen teams battled 10 rounds and finally the winners were 'Let's Get Quizzical' with 72 points, 2nd place were 'Crofters' with 71 points and 3rd 'Cockers and Cairns' with 68 points, so a close-run thing! The Eliminator during the break was about National Parks and their countries and was won by Ed Harradence.

Along with the raffle and sale of extra pasties/refreshments, the total sum raised for Marie Curie Nurses was £380.

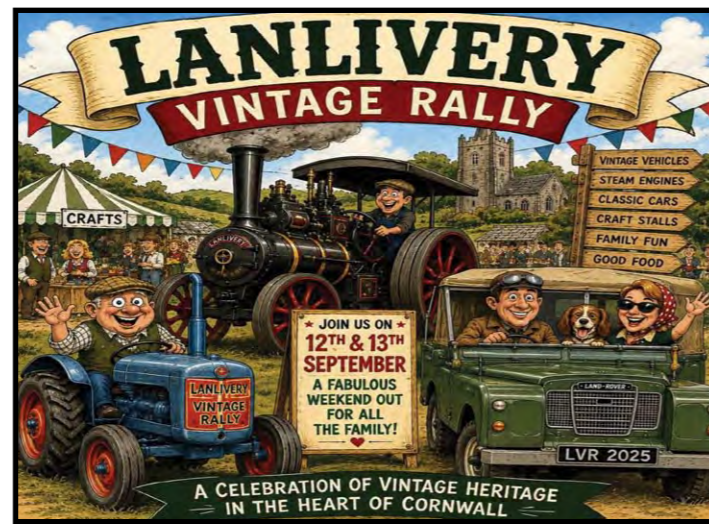



## FROM CHURCH

Dear Friends,

May marks the end of the Easter season and the beginning of what is affectionately known as 'ordinary time' in the Church calendar. The pivot happens at the feast of Pentecost on May 24th this year. Every Sunday is always a celebration of the resurrection, so it's hard to see what is ordinary about it. The events of the Christ's death and resurrection are the turning point of history. It is a world-shattering event that means life can never be the same again. The book of Acts tells us how the disciples' lives were turned upside down by it. In their grief at the loss of Jesus a number were considering returning to their previous occupations. Once they encountered the risen Lord, they decided to change the world instead!

However, it was not just historical events which changed things. It was the outpouring of the Holy Spirit. The Christian faith has always been a supernatural one. In the struggles to fill rotas, find volunteers, maintain buildings and serve our communities we can easily forget this. If the Christian life was just a set of rules to obey, religious acts to observe and an institution to maintain, it would not have lasted very long. Trusting in the Holy Spirit to empower and lead is less safe than seeking to control events ourselves.

The celebration of Pentecost is often described as a birthday party for the church, when we remember the gift of the Holy Spirit to the first disciples in Acts, so what are we celebrating?

God's Promise: The disciples obeyed Jesus' instructions as they gathered in the Upper Room: 'Do not leave Jerusalem but wait for the gift My Father promised'. They met expectantly in prayer for God's promised gift. Just as we look forward to birthday presents, how eager are we to receive more of the Spirit in our lives?

God's Power: 'All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit'. The disciples needed the power of the Spirit to be different: not fearfully gathered behind locked doors but instead energised to make Christ known. The Spirit can transform our lives into the likeness of Jesus and give gifts to equip our witness. Although the disciples' experience of this power was overwhelming, it was essentially an encounter with God's love. For us, this can be equally emotional or quiet, but all of us are included, and nobody is excluded from this experience.

God's Purpose: The disciples 'began to speak in other tongues as the Spirit enabled them.' The Spirit empowered their witness, so that everyone heard them speaking in their own 'native language'. We all have a story to tell of God's activity in our lives, and the Spirit will translate our words and actions into a language that those around can understand!

We are told about the fruit of the Spirit. This is what we are to bear out with the Spirit within us. Galatians 5 teaches us "the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control."

It is important to note that it says "fruit" not 'fruits'. We don't have to choose between having more patience or faith etc. We can pray for all the fruit of Spirit. God in his love for us sent us the Holy Spirit so that, just like planting a seed, we can bear this fruit. However, like tending a plant, we need to tend to ourselves.

Therefore, I encourage you to nurture the Holy Spirit within you. Bear the fruit and pray to be refreshed whenever you need. In doing so, we can all bless and reflect the love of God onto all those with who we come into contact. So, 'Come Holy Spirit and kindle the hearts of your people with the fire of your love'.

Dear Friends,

We have enjoyed a warm spell of weather, a sure sign the holiday season is almost here. What would be your ideal holiday? Being sun-baked on a golden beach? A walking holiday in the hills? Visiting the finest English stately homes? Simply taking a break from our normal commitments? More and more people are taking Staycations, holidays from home. After all, a change is as good as a rest. Whatever shape the holiday may

take, holidays, or more precisely holy days, allow us to do something different, to learn more about the world and ourselves.

Unfortunately, Christians have sometimes interpreted Sabbath holy day observance in terms of prohibitions - don't do this, don't do that. How many young lives were blighted by not being allowed to play or even make a noise on a Sunday, unless it was associated with hymn singing or Bible reading? Whilst undoubtedly well intentioned, such a restrictive approach to Sabbath holy days has been largely, and in my view rightly, abandoned. Not just because it may have driven countless people away from having anything to do with Christianity, but because it fails to reflect the true meaning of Sabbath as shown and taught by Jesus.

When it came to the Sabbath, Jesus put people first. Sabbath rest was intended as a blessing for people - and any donkeys that happen to fall down wells, let alone any person who had suffered the same undignified fate (Luke 14:5). Jesus' reclamation of the true meaning of the Sabbath almost certainly brought him into conflict with the religious powers of his day. Jesus taught the celebration of the love and compassion, creativity and life-enhancing purpose for which all creation exists is the proper way to keep the Sabbath holy. Holy holidays give a glimpse into the ultimate celebration of the meaning of life, the universe and everything.

Whatever holiday 2026 means to us, may every day be a holy day in the celebration of love and life, whether we are at work, rest or play, as the chocolate advert used to say.

## COUNTRY DIARY

**11th MARCH 2026**

Holly leaves shine cold as steel in the pale afternoon sunlight. The sudden call of a yaffle is carried on the brisk northwest wind.

Just before 7am. I hear a tawny owl calling softly amongst some thick ivy above the stream. He is preparing to roost while I am waking with the sun.

**18th MARCH**

A bright day. In the sheltered area by PONDS 2 and 3 a male brimstone flies to and fro, high and low. He will have hibernated over winter in thick ivy or brambles and will now be seeking a female. I hope he finds one!

**20th MARCH**

Just before 11am today we arrive at the vernal equinox. As I prune and feed the roses I look forward to their fragrant blooms at midsummer when the sun will have reached its zenith. Looking westward at twilight, I see the crescent moon, a golden 'gondola' floating atop the ever-darkening trees.

**21st MARCH**

A queen bumblebee continues her urgent search for a suitable nesting site. Do I keep meeting the same one? Looking towards the distant pines I observe a pair of crows 'mobbing' a pair of ravens. They are driving them northwards in what appears to be a territorial confrontation.

**31st MARCH**

March retreats like a lamb into the pastures of memory. Abundant blackthorn blossom and golden willow catkins create the perfect frame to this moment in time.

**2nd APRIL**

I encounter a roe deer hind and a rabbit in the flower garden. The hind bounds off along Bullfinch Lane while the rabbit ceases nibbling red campion foliage and hops off into the undergrowth. I discover that the deer has 're-pruned' my roses that I tended so carefully last month!

**7th APRIL**

Luxulyan friends Maggie and Keith report seeing two swallows over Seven Stars late this afternoon.

**8th APRIL**

An 'armada' of fallen male willow catkins sails relentlessly downstream.

**10th APRIL**

I come upon a pair of mallard foraging on POND 3. I wonder where they are nesting. Tonight I hear the tawny owls calling to each other. The male utters a soft "hoo-hoo" from the ivy above the flower garden. The female calls "kewick, kewick" just beyond willow wood.

**17th APRIL**

The ivy bush by the garage wall has provided a rich bounty of ripe berries for blackbirds and blackcaps over the past few weeks. Today, from my vantage point in the kitchen, I manage to grab a shot of a female blackcap with a berry in her beak.

**23rd APRIL**

Two holly blue butterflies flit high amongst the holly trees and a female brimstone flies across the garden.

**25th APRIL**

The rough east wind of recent days has finally left, and all is now calm. A pair of orange tips sip nectar from the honesty flowers. I discover some butterfly eggs on the nettles so will leave well alone. Late afternoon a newly fledged family of siskins call excitedly from a large ash tree.

**26th APRIL**

At 6.45.am I hear a cuckoo on Treskilling Downs. Later in the day the warmth of the afternoon releases the heady fragrance of the bluebells along Bullfinch Lane and beyond.

**27th APRIL**

Hot in the sun. I pause to watch a comma butterfly laying her eggs on the nettle patch. Down by the ponds the yellow flag irises are already in bloom!

**28th APRIL**

By the stream I discover what appears to be a water voles' 'latrine'. As I stand in the water I discern several holes in the bank Further research is needed.

## COUNTRY DIARY

**2nd MAY**

A song thrush greets the dawn singing lustily amongst the unfurling leaves of the black poplar. The cuckoo calls from afar.

**4th MAY**

The gentle breeze has triggered the annual migration of willow seeds.

**22nd JUNE 1986**

We hear the robin nestlings squeaking from the kettle that we had placed in the ivy by the hen run early in the season.

**24th JUNE 1986**

David reports that the 'kettle' family fledged soon after sunrise on this midsummer morning.

**23rd JULY 1985**

Driving home from work today I pull into a small area just before the Trefulefoot roundabout to photograph the diversity of plant life here. Amongst the various flowering grasses, I find tufted vetch, burdock, sorrel, red campion, oxeye daisy, cow parsnip and common mallow. I also discover a male large skipper butterfly.



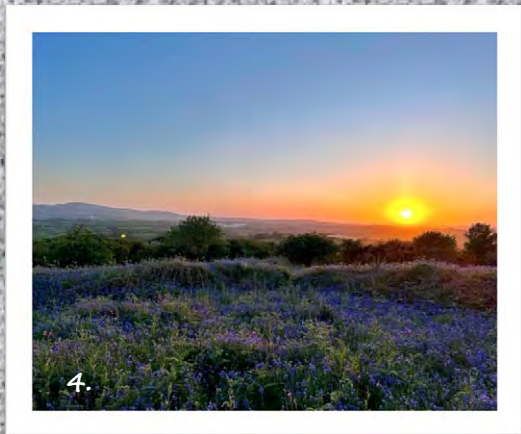
